Background	<p>Many instructors share course-related information with their students using a course website. This is a useful tool to make information available to students without distributing large paper handouts during in-person classes or multiple attachments in emails. A website is also a great way to provide supplemental information for students with a deeper interest in the subject, more than can be conveyed in the classroom.</p>	
Benefits	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Cuts down on the volume of paper copies made and distributed. 2. Permits sharing of supplemental information, like videos, audio files, documents, websites, etc. 3. Allows students to access information at their convenience, 24 / 7. 4. Allows the instructor to modify the posted information at any time.
