Background	Many instructors share course-related information with their students using a course website. This is a useful tool to make information available to students without distributing large paper handouts during in-person classes or multiple attachments in emails. A website is also a great way to provide supplemental information for students with a deeper interest in the subject, more than can be conveyed in the classroom.	
Benefits	<ol> <li>Cuts down on the volume of paper copies made and distributed.</li> <li>Permits sharing of supplemental information, like videos, audio files, documents, websites, etc.</li> <li>Allows students to access information at their convenience, 24 / 7.</li> <li>Allows the instructor to modify the posted information at any time.</li> </ol>
